Inventions Theme Project


This year, the middle school decided to have theme projects all year long.

Ms. Baker, Mr. Huff, Mrs. Shmarak, and Mrs. Toumajan directed the first theme, Inventions. This theme was divided into three parts: research, creation, and field trip.

Each student in the middle school researched an invention and presented it to their class in some way other than a report. Videos, poster boards, and power point presentations were some ways the students presented their subject. Each class picked the top three presentations that were presented to the middle school. This included Lara Demirjian (escalator), Ovsana Bush (post-it notes), Zena Atcho (traffic light), Damaris Duduman (Tesla Earthquake Machine), Angel Kazandjian (artificial heart), Inna Mirzoyan (computer), Carolyn Philip (parachute) Julian Jarbo (toilet paper), and Linda Kalfayan (piano).

The second part consisted of students breaking into groups to create a Rube Goldberg invention. The requirements mandated that each group create a project that had 10 steps to complete an objective. After three days of parents coming in to help groups, the projects were shown. The top three winners had Rube Goldbergs that could cut paper, feed the cat, and put out a candle.

The third, and last, part of the Inventions project was a trip to the COSI in Toledo, Ohio. This hands-on museum allowed students to interact with different ideas related to science and inventions.

Great Achievement in High School

When the first-quarter GPAs were calculated, a sense of joy permeated the High School. Principal Dr. H. Torossian posted the results on the bulletin board that reads "Manoogian Pride." The analysis of the GPAs indicated that 32% of the high school students were on the Administrator's List, having achieved a GPA of 3.5 or better. In addition, 17% of the students were on the Honor Roll, with GPAs between 3.0 and 3.5. It is also worth mentioning that 36% of the students achieved a GPA between 2.0 and 3.0, making this first quarter the best in the high school's academic history. The school's administration, faculty, and staff are equally proud that 48 students, out of a total of 112, having maintained perfect citizenship, were also honored during the high school assembly, which took place on November 21, at the high school multi-purpose room. Several parents and the entire High School faculty were present to congratulate the Manoogian scholars. "This unprecedented success is partly due to the fact that 25 of last year's 28 eighth-graders joined the Manoogian High School, and were major contributors to our academic success," said Dr. Torossian.



A school-wide canned-food drive, poster decorating, and visits to classrooms by upper-level students were some of the activities that happened during Character Week at the Manoogian School, from November 27 to December 1. The Manoogian Chapter of the National Honor Society sponsored the event.

Students brought in 1,310 cans of food during the week to donate to Forgotten Harvest. The fourth-grade class, which collected 267 cans, was awarded a pizza party for bringing in the most cans. Classes throughout the school decorated posters to represent the six pillars of character: respect, responsibility, caring, fairness, trustworthiness, and citizenship.

Middle school students participated in "Mix It Up" at lunch on November 29, in which students sat with other students they don't normally sit with, in an effort to interact with new people.

High school students were treated to a guest speaker, police officer William Pylkas, who spoke about character and talked about his experience as an undercover police officer.

To finish the week, students in 7th through 12th grades visited students in Pre-K 4 through 6th grades for one hour. The students worked together on character-building activities.

JAGBU Fund-raiser

Sponsored by third-grade teacher Mrs. Roxanne Kourtjian, the JAGBU (Junior Armenian General Benevolent Union) Club members sold Sally Foster wrapping paper and specialty items as a fund-raiser. The total amount raised was \$4,400.50. The Manoogian School gets 50% of the profit from this sale.
