Harriet Tubman was born on March 10, 1822 in Dorchester County, MD

Araminta Ross was one of nine children, both her parents were enslaved. Her mother, Harriet Green, was owned to Mary Pattison Brodess, and her father, Ben Ross, was owned to Anthony Thompson. Harriet was born into slavery at age five, or six began to be a house servant. Seven years later became a slave, in 1849 she later escaped. It took her thirteen missions to rescue her family, and friends. Using the network of antislavery activists, and safe houses known as the underground railroad.
