Graduation address of 2021 - Hosep Torossian, Principal

It was the best of times because this outstanding class received 85 University acceptances, 8 of which came from the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, the most selective college in Michigan.

It was the VERY Best of times because this phenomenal class was offered \$4.6 million in total four-year scholarships. This class surpassed all previous records by more than \$2 million. My guess is that this stellar record is unlikely to be broken anytime soon, although I assure you that we will try.

It was the Best of times when, for the first time in the 52-year history of our school, a student was offered admissions to Brown University, an Ivy league school with full-ride, (including books, housing, and a paid summer research position for two years). One of our Junior Class students Hagop Alajajian proceeded to be one of 10 State finalists among 2000 participants in his global initiative design. Our most unique and highly active Simon Yaldo was also recognized by Square One. He won the Mike Bammer Memorial \$500 scholarship to be applied at any University of his choice. Thank you, team Manoogian, and thank you Mr. Scott and Mr. Schroeder for your leadership in STEM.
